Letters

The Apostle Paul said, "I have laid a foundation, ... each one should be careful how he builds." I Cor. 3:10

"To all the saints in Christ Jesus at Philippi, together with the overseers and deacons. Phil. 1:1

"We also rejoice in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have received reconciliation." Rom. 5:11

"...So it is with Christ. For we were all baptized by one Spirit into one body." I Cor. 12:12, 13. See 12:27-31.

"From Him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love as each part does its work." Eph. 4:16. See I Tim. 1:3; 3:15; 5:17; Rev. 2:1-7

Church in Rome: To call people from among the Gentiles to the obedience of faith. Rom. 1:5; 16:26

"You who are not my people, they will be called sons of the living God." Rom. 9:26

Note our choices of functions and roles in the body of Christ where we can offer our bodies as a living sacrifice. Rom. 12:1, 4-8

The principle of reading the content in Acts between the Gospels and the letters is being illustrated in this chart. Please note the following instructions.

The Church Jesus Built

The church of God in Christ Jesus (I Thess. 2:14).

Please note the headings above the three columns. Again, we want to hear what Jesus said first about what He, as king and priest, planned to do in Acts (column 1). After understanding His thoughts we will see what He did and how He did it in Acts (column 2). Then we want to read from the letters to learn how what Jesus taught (Gospels) and did (Acts) was worked out in the churches (Letters, column 3).

This chart is designed to help Christians teach our neighbors about the church Jesus built.

Column one: These scriptures help us understand Jesus' concept of the church He planned to build at a future time.

Column two: He did build His church as we can see by the scriptures from Acts.

Column three: The letters to the churches fill out our view of the church Jesus is building today or the one He desires. His church is being "added to" by each church's evangelism programs. A healthy church is successful in two fields.

One, each individual member contributes to help keep the body of Christ healthy (I Cor. 12:12, 13; Eph. 4:14-16). The body is made up of members who find a way to function under the will of the head, Jesus Christ (Eph. 1:22, 23).

We find a way to give back to the body the strength we have gained from being in the body (I Pet. 4:10). Members keep the body strong (Rom. 15:14). We have "production capability." II Pet. 1:8.

Two, we serve our king by working His strategies for seeking and saving the lost. Since we have been reconciled to God (Rom. 5:11), we have been given the ministry of reconciliation (II Cor. 5:18-21; Matt. 28:18-20; III John 3-8). **This is production**. For a church to be productive we need to first enhance the production capabilities of the body of Christ (II Cor. 10:15). *A sick goose will not be capable of producing golden eggs.*

Questions for Discussion

- 1. Please read the second page for instructions for using this chart. How might we apply the old adage that "A sick goose will not be capable of producing golden eggs" to a particular church?
- 2. This lesson should impress every Bible student with the value of using a unique biblical interpretation principle for reading Acts. Please explain the principle.

- 3. Jesus used the word "build" in His first reference to His church. Why might it be a better word than start, establish or plant?
- 4. In our previous lesson we used Paul's commission to evangelize the Gentiles to understand the movement in a new birth (Acts 26:18). How does this same scripture help us understand how Jesus used the word "church?"
- 5. In order to build, something must be gathered for the construction. What was preached to start Jesus building project? How many were gathered by the first apostolic sermon?
- 6. How does reading Paul's letter to the Corinthians enlighten us about the difference between building a church for Jesus and just starting a congregation? What had Jesus stated about Himself that would strengthen I Corinthians 3:10?
- 7. From Jesus' conversation with the Samaritan woman at Jacob's well, how do we understand the church Jesus planned to build could not be described by addresses where buildings stand or by who is filling the pulpit?
- 8. How does the concept of a church in John 15:1-8; I Cor. 12:12-31; Eph. 4:14-16 enhance the description of the church we were introduced to in Acts 2:42; 4:32; 9:31?
- 9. Please explain the connection between what Jesus said in John 10:16 and Luke 13:29 with the praying and fasting event in Acts 13:3. Now please overlay this with the information in Romans 1:5; 9:26 and write a paragraph about "caste" and the church Jesus built.
- 10. How does the concept of reconciliation shed light on Acts 2:47?
- 11. We are informed in Acts 2:38 and 5:32 how the Holy Spirit was given to all people who obeyed Jesus. There are also fifty other scriptures in Acts revealing how very active the Holy Spirit was engaged with Jesus' evangelism program for His Father. Please read Romans chapter eight and list some blessings Christians enjoy because the Holy Spirit has been given to "those who believe."
- 12. We understand the church government Jesus had in mind for the church He planned to build was a plurality of leaders of elders in Acts 14:23. We learn much more about the details in the letters to Timothy and Titus.
